The Silver Books Project

The guest speaker at our February 2022 Membership Meeting was introduced by Governor Ann Campbell. Bonnie Wade Mucia, a Forensic Genealogist, is the Director of the Silver Books Project and our General Society Member-at-Large. Ms. Mucia spoke



on "The History, The Project and Future" of the Silver Books, which trace five generations of each Mayflower passenger. The 22 volumes (consisting of 42 books) are used by historians, families, and genealogists – in particular, by Mayflower Society genealogists in verifying applications.

The project was formally known as the Five Generation Project, started in 1959, and in 1971, Lucy Kellogg became the first editor of what became the Silver Books. The first volume was released in 1975, and multiple volumes have followed since that time. A style guide and templates have been developed, and a reference guide is now available on the Mayflower Society website for downloading.

Ms. Mucia noted that there are also four volumes of the Picton Press Volumes, by Elizabeth Pearson White. The volumes, which cover John Howland and Elizabeth Tilley, are out of print, but the research can be printed by the Mayflower Society. Volume 23, Part Five of the Silver Books is now underway with this research, and there is also a Silver Books Index Directory (volume 1) that is currently underway.

In total, the 18 members of the Silver Books team are working on the research and updating of 14 books, and we are grateful for all the hard work and research they do. The current volumes are available on a new landing page on the Mayflower Society website, while most state societies have a complete set for referral.

GOVERNOR'S MESSAGE



I want to especially thank the members of the Board of Assistants for their continued service and recognize those who have volunteered to

chair committees: Bruce Babcock (Finance), Annie John (Scholarship) Donald Lamson (Bylaws and Nominations), and Suzy Mulligan (Membership). The board also approved three new members of the Board:

Grace Fischetti (Member-at-Large) John Kropf (Member-at-Large) Suzy Mulligan (Membership Secretary) Eleanor Richards (Surgeon).

Other highlights from our last Board Meeting include our membership numbers, as of December 31, 2021, which were a total number of 414, including 167 Life Members and 247 Annual Members, with 8 Junior Members.

Based on the Treasurer's Report, for the quarter ending December 31, 2021, we had on hand \$295,177.46 in our accounts, which is an increase of \$17,901.78 from the last quarter. We have since received an invoice for the Annual Assessment due to GSMD in the amount of \$12,820 due not later than April 1, 2022. Because of the good work of the Treasurer and the Finance Committee, we have more than enough to cover payment of the invoice.

The quarterly publication of our newsletter, called "Pilgrim News" continues with Board Member Suzy Mulligan is leading this project as editor. Our special publication, the 2020 – 2021 Member Directory, called "The Register", commemorating the 400th Anniversary of the Mayflowers' arrival in Plymouth Harbor is at the printer. Copies will be mailed to those who requested a printed copy.

Thanks to Members Lise Harvey and Suzy Mulligan for their combined efforts to make this a reality.

We continue our outreach to those Life Members for whom we do not have an email address. Life Member. Molly Greene is leading this project. She is the daughter of a former Governor of our Society Brigadier General Michael J.L, Greene, who served from 1995-1997. She provides me periodic updates so that we do not lose touch with our Life Members.

Thanks to Past Governor and current Counsellor, Donald Lamson for achieving two important goals: (1) Downsizing of property in storage, including deaccession of books and reference materials, to reduce storage costs to the Society is complete and (2) Coordinating the proposed rewrite of Society Constitution and Bylaws, resulting in unanimous approval by the Board [and Members].

In closing, I want to reiterate the debt of gratitude we owe these volunteers, officers and other members of the Board of Assistants without whose good works our Society could not function.

The Women and Girls of the Mayflower Voyage

In 1620 women and girls were considered weak and not strong enough to endure the hardship and rigors of a transatlantic journey to the "New World". Several of the married male passengers left their wives and daughters home for this reason. However, some husbands and fathers did bring their wives and daughters.

When the Mayflower embarked on her voyage, there were eleven young girls, ranging in age from one to seventeen on board and eighteen adult women, three who whom were in their third trimester of pregnancy. Only two of the eleven young girls died during the first winter with thirteen of the women not surviving as well.

Humility Cooper was the youngest, travelling with her aunt and uncle, Ann and Edward Tilley. John and Joan Tilley, made the journey with their daughter Elizabeth. Elizabeth Hopkins, one of the pregnant women, accompanied her husband Stephen Hopkins and daughters Constance and Damaris. Their child was born on the Mayflower while en route. He was named Oceanus. Thirteen year old Mary Chilton, along with her mother and father, James made the treacherous voyage along with passengers Isaac and Mary Allerton, and daughters Remember, age six and Mary, age four. William Mullins brought his family of a son, Joseph, wife, Alice and daughter Priscilla, who is the only family member who survived the first winter.

The two young girls, who perished were the More sisters, Ellen age 8 and Mary age four. Sadly, they were abandoned by their father who gained custody of them, after divorcing his wife who had an affair. It became know that the children were not his biological children. He thought they were fare better in the New World, and save them from the social embarrassment and out casting of being born outside the bonds of marriage. The brave women who landed in Plymouth in 1620, who perished during that first winter are Mary Allerton, Dorothy Bradford, Katherine Carver (May 1621), Mrs. Chilton, Sarah Eaton, Mrs. Fuller, Mary P. Martin, Alice Mullins, Alice Ragsdale, Rose Standish, Agnes Tilley, Mrs. Tinker, Elizabeth Winslow, and Dorothy (John Carver's servant). Survivors are Susanna White, Eleanor Billington, Elizabeth Hopkins and Mary Brewster.

As we welcome spring this month let us also remember these brave young girls and women for a moment or two to honor them during Women's History Month, March 2022.
